Plant 3,000 trees each: HC to 2G scam accused

In a unique 'cost' imposed for seeking more time to file response to the ED's plea challenging their acquittal in the 2G case, the Delhi HC on Thursday asked Swan Telecom's promoter Shahid Balwa, the director of Kusegaon Fruits and Vegetables, Rajeev Agarwal and three firms, namely Dynamic Realty, DB Realty, and Nihar Constructions, to plant 3,000 trees each in Delhi's South Ridge forest area. The said plantation has to be done before the next date of hearing.

All the accused persons and companies have been directed by the court to appear before the Deputy Conservator of Forests on February 15 to get the land allocated for the planting of these trees. The people and the firms also have to ensure the upkeep of these plants until the monsoons, the court said. A single judge Bench of Justice Nazmi Waziri also granted them one final opportunity to file their responses by February 15. The CBI and ED had moved the Delhi HC in March 2018 challenging the acquittal of all the accused by a lower court in Delhi.

Road firms don't rely on NHAI data

When a top private equity firm placed its bid for the National Highway Authority of India's (NHAI's) toll-operate-transfer first round, its team had already spent months surveying traffic volumes on those stretches. This is not an exception, but a norm, where most road firms do not rely on the NHAI traffic estimates, but build their own. With scope for inaccuracy and misreporting, industry officials prefer to stick to their own means. An email query sent to officials at the NHAI remained unanswered.

"The NHAI tenders these traffic surveys out to private companies, which opens it up to a possibility of malpractices," said an official from a road developer firm. The NHAI, with its concessionaires and financial institutions, incorporated the Indian Highways Management Company to carry out electronic tolling and other allied works by the NHAI, including traf-AMRITHA PILLAX fic survey tenders.
